WSU Health Sciences Mentorship Program

Formerly Stevens County Mentorship Program

The WSU Health Sciences Mentorship
Program is a dynamic career awareness and preparation initiative that inspires rural youth to explore healthcare professions. Launched in 2019 through a partnership with community leaders in Stevens County, the program has grown to serve nearly 1000+ students yearly across 11 school districts.

Also known by its guiding philosophy, "You Can't Be What You Can't See," the program offers career-connected learning opportunities for students in grades 7–11. It helps youth and their families understand local health needs, explore diverse healthcare careers, and build the



skills and confidence to pursue their goals. Success means students become more self-aware, informed, and empowered to shape their future.

MENTORSHIP & CURRICULUM DESIGN

Three core components anchor the program:

- **Mentorship** from trained volunteers
- Age-appropriate health curriculum
- Longitundinal contact

Mentors—known as **Health Career Navigators**—introduce students to the full spectrum of healthcare careers while fostering personal growth and leadership. Between **60 and 100 volunteers** from WSU's health sciences colleges and regional health organizations support students through a curriculum written by faculty experts.

Highlights include:

- A **10th-grade anatomy and physiology module** authored by a faculty member from the Elson S. Floyd College of Medicine
- A **healthy relationships unit** developed by a College of Nursing faculty member
- Support for launching and sustaining HOSA clubs in middle and high schools to build vouth leadership
- **Peer-to-peer behavioral health mentorship**, where students are trained as leaders to draw in other younger students highlighted by adults, that may need extra support.

Beyond the classroom, students engage in **hands-on learning at WSU Spokane labs**, interacting directly with faculty and college students. The **9th-grade Foundations of Health Careers course** culminates in a spring **capstone research event**, where students present their work to families, educators, and community leaders over dinner.

COMMUNITY IMPACT

The program is currently active in 11 school districts, including:

- Stevens County: Wellpinit, Mary Walker, Valley, Chewelah
- Additional districts: Freeman, Sprague, Pasco including Orion, Vancouver, Elma, and Plummer, ID

With resources supporting school district staff and program coordination, nearly \$1 million in



grant funding has been received. We also addresses **workforce development challenges** in healthcare and emergency services, including:

- Partnering with Stevens County Fire District 1 to train volunteers for paid emergency response roles
- Collaborating with Providence to identify pathways from high school into paid healthcare employment

INSTITUTIONAL VALUE

The WSU Health Sciences Mentorship Program offers a meaningful platform for faculty to share their expertise with rural youth. This program aligns with WSU's land-grant mission to improve lives through practical education and community engagement.

50+ faculty members have contributed to curriculum development and mentorship, enhancing educational outcomes and expanding awareness of healthcare careers.

For WSU students, participation in the program may count toward:

- Clinical rotations
- Service-learning hours
- Scholarly projects

These experiences support degree completion, strengthen students' professional readiness for post-graduation careers and foster success in all areas of life, including mental and emotional well-being.
